Annual Parish Meeting

This will be held on 22^{nd} April at 7pm in the Village Hall. Please join us.

The agenda will include updates about:

- The Lucks Lane, Mill Road and Silver Street sites,
- Proposals for the Roundabout
- The Neighbourhood Plan
- Plans for the Village Hall and Recreation Ground
- Policing.

There will also be presentations from our County and District Councillors.

Mill Road

We met with representatives from Cambridgeshire County Council on 3rd February to present our case for traffic calming measures on this road. The petition organised in the village to reduce the speed limit was presented at the meeting. You may have seen an article about the meeting in the Hunts Post. Our bid is now being prioritised and we expect to hear the outcome in March.

Climate Change Mitigation

We will be producing frequent updates going forward with ideas about what we can all do to help. The first of these is on this page below.

Buckden Neighbourhood Plan

We have nearly completed the update of the plan to take account of the feedback received and will shortly be submitting the plan for inspection. We will keep you updated as this progresses.

Silver Street and Mill Road developments

At the time of writing the hold on both developments was still in place to end of February. We are still awaiting an update from Highways England about proposals for the Roundabout. If we hear anything in the next couple of weeks, we will put an update on the Council web site and on Facebook.


Speedwatch

We now have several trained volunteers ready to start Speedwatch again. The initial locations include Mill Road, Church Street and Lucks Lane. We are also looking into doing HGV watch to identify those lorries ignoring the warning signs. We would still like more volunteers and have some further training dates in March. If you are interested in being involved, please contact the Parish Clerk.

Perry Road

Following a successful speedwatch campaign in Perry Road we are now awaiting the installation of a new mobile speed camera which shows the actual speed of passing motorists,

gates marking the entry to the village with much more prominent speed signs and the introduction of a 40mph section of road. The speed camera is mobile and can be placed in designated sites around the village



From your District Councillor

Transformation

I wrote about this a year ago, and since then this programme has been developing at National, County, and District Council level steadily. Transformation is the term for a large scale realignment of Government, Local Government and Voluntary sector bodies to provide better and more focussed Social Care and better delivery at a local level.

In Cambridgeshire one of several programs is called "Cambs 2020, Community Hubs and Spokes" Basically this means that that various functions currently centred in or near Cambridge City will be re-located to different population centres to the north or south. As many already know the County Council will relocate to Alconbury and will then be supported by at least one main community hub building in each of the of the five district council areas.

These administrative and delivery centres will be supported in turn by a network of satellite community hubs — Libraries, Parish and Village Halls, GP Surgeries, possibly Churches etc. Staff will be drawn from across the public sector to provide multi-skilled locality teams that are able to meet the needs of our communities. Improved data networks will help to identify the vulnerable and needy. Establishing links with existing voluntary sector organisations will be a priority for these teams. Funding is probable, and while plans have yet to be finalised and agreed, it is expected that the voluntary sector will benefit in some form.

So, what does this mean for Buckden? Firstly, the Library, a key part of our civic infrastructure, will have key swipe card access and longer opening hours to provide a place for people to connect, to learn new skills and be part of the community. This will be supported by organised events and activities, business briefings for local trades to support skills and employment, stop social isolation and promote the growth of new community enterprises. The Village Hall will play a large role in supporting this and may be able to become a base for the various specialist teams located in the area.

A1/ Transport

I have had several useful discussions with our MP and urged him to review arguments for a Western bypass for Southoe and Buckden, from Ellington to the revised Black Cat. He has kindly responded by saying he will pick this issue up with the new Transport Minister, once the Cabinet Reshuffle is over. In the meantime he has had talks with Richard Fuller, the new MP for North East Bedfordshire, and a further meeting was held with Simon Amor, Regional Director of Highways England. At this time, the Road Assessment Scheme only allows for committed Development - Development within the Local Plan - to be considered when assessing road schemes and the Government has been clear that this is tied to delivery of new housing projects. That said, there is evidence in the last few days on bridges and hybrid cars, that Government policy can rapidly change.

From your County Councillor

In my article for last month's Roundabout, I provided the background against which the County Council has to make its decision on services and council tax levels.

The essence of the challenge is that:

- levels of demand are increasing, while central government support to local authorities has been declining over recent years and
- the amounts by which local councils may increase tax are capped by central government. Not an easy situation to deal with.

Another variable is Boris Johnson! Anything might happen! Even while the February County Council meeting was taking place, he was announcing extra money for local bus services and cycle ways and by the time *Roundabout* reaches you, he may well have announced something else.

The County Council met early in February to make a decision for the coming year April 2020 – March 2021. I won't bore you with an account of a tetchy meeting but if anybody is really interested in the detail of the arguments put forward by the different political groups, I can tell you about them.

Because the Conservatives have a majority on the County Council (in 2017 they won back all the seats stolen from them by UKIP in 2013), in the end all the huffing and puffing by the opposition parties makes no real difference.

So, the first decision was to raise the council tax by the permitted 2% towards the extra costs of adult social care, and all sides agreed that was both desirable and essential. The ill-tempered argument was over the other permitted increase of

1.99% towards other Council services. Both the opposition parties, Labour and Liberal Democrats, made the case for using the full 1.99% so that the services people want and expect can be protected from further reduction. The ruling group, understandably anxious to keep their low tax credentials, proposed 1.59% increase. The difference between the two, if you live in a Band D house, amounts to a saving of 11 pence a week. The 1.59% decision reduces the income to the county by about £1.5 million.

The ruling group insisted that they are finding new ways called 'Transformation', of delivering services more cost-effectively without harming those in greatest need. They also emphasised that the County Council is making strenuous efforts to increase income by commercial activities. It will shortly be moving its HQ out of Cambridge to Alconbury Weald where a new energy-efficient building will reduce running costs. The present Shire Hall will be leased to a hotel company and will therefore generate income.

Attending the Buckden Parish Council meeting on the same evening as the Council Tax decision day served as a salutary reminder that, at grassroots level, there is a sense of frustration about how slowly highways improvements are agreed and acted upon. I know that this view is widely shared across the county and is indicative of the pressures on CCC staff.

I will continue to do what I can to keep the Parish Council fully informed and will continue to remind fellow county councillors in Cambridge that, in spite of their claims that all is going really well and services are being 'transformed', that is not how it is always perceived at local level.

Buckden Neighbourhood Watch

Scams

The police have received an alert to say that text messages are currently being sent across the UK apparently from the Royal Mail, informing the recipient that they have a parcel for collection. The text will provide a link requesting that the recipient should click on it in order to make the collection. Don't. It is highly likely that there is no parcel to collect. Are you waiting for a parcel? If not, be suspicious and never provide personal information that could lead to the theft of your identity and money.

Criminals often use some form of malicious social engineering in their communications. They might rely on fear or anxiety such as purporting to be the Police, or Bailiffs. They might use a financial incentive such as a prize, a gift, a higher interest rate and in the above example they know people will be curious about receiving a parcel.

Please don't click on a link within an email, a text, or any form of instant messaging service unless satisfied the sender is genuine. If in doubt, delete the message and try to verify the message through a trusted means. Do not reply to the original message.

Phone Calls

You may receive a phone call which informs you that your personal details have been fraudulently used to subscribe to Amazon Prime. Put the telephone down - it is scam. Amazon will not phone you asking for personal details.

Action Fraud Advice

Never install software as a result of a cold call. Always question uninvited approaches in case it's a scam. If in doubt contact a company directly using a known email address or phone number. Feel confident to refuse unusual requests for personal of financial information.

Thought for the Month

Greetings in the Holy name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus built his community after a long period of personal development and transformation. Previously he learned to be free and loving. He acquired the necessary communication skills and all other capabilities required to achieve his mission. Therefore, his own personal experience of the father and development are the cornerstone of the community that prolongs his liberating and salvific work on earth. Usually, action means life, power, transformation. Therefore, the level of behaviours and positive experience empowers people. Information has a high value in our days. Still, knowledge without action remains infertile. That's why Jesus declares: "It is not anyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord', who will enter the kingdom of heaven but the person who does the will of my father in heaven... therefore everyone who listens to these words of mine and acts on them will be like the sensible man who built his house on rock" (Mt. 7: 21, 24-25).

Therefore, we are called to put into action what we have learned from Jesus. When we try to put into practice the knowledge and information that we have about Jesus, this will lead to the reality, i.e. Jesus Christ. Our internal dialogue thoughts, mental strategies, plans - plays a central role in the process of getting the best side of reality. This level of our mind, the level of thinking, is sometimes related with our heart in the biblical language. At this level we display our capabilities, either to do good or to do evil.

Most of the time, on this level of capabilities, our thinking makes use of words. Therefore, words reveal our thoughts and mental strategies. If we think or utter positive words,

then we empower ourselves or others. "For words flow out of what fills the heart. Good people draw good things from the store of goodness; bad people draw bad things from the store of badness" (Mt. 12:34-35). From this perspective it is easier to understand the importance that Jesus gives to words. They may empower or disempower us; they may give life or death. "So, I tell you this, that for every unfounded word people utter they will answer on judgment day. Since it is by your words you will be justified, and by your words condemned" (Mt. 12:36-37).

My dear brothers and sisters, there are many reasons to consider Jesus as the greatest leader throughout history. One of them is his ability to empower people at the deepest level, i.e. at the level of identity. When he starts his preaching, according to the sermon on the mount, he shows the beauty, radiance and power of people's identity: "You are the light of the world" (Mt 5:14). Jesus empowers his followers by deepening their identity on the spiritual level. After he has said, "you are the light of the world," he adds, "Your light must shine in people's sight, so that, seeing your good works, they may give praise to your Father in heaven" (Mt 5:16).

The role of Christians is to receive the light of Christ and radiate it to everyone as love, kindness, mercy, forgiveness, humble service, respect for those with different ethnic backgrounds, different lifestyles, other faiths, or with no faith at all. With a little bit of Christ's Light, we become a veritable lighthouse, illuminating the way for many and removing the darkness caused by hatred, spite and jealousy. I wish you all a good preparation of Lent for the meaningful celebration of EASTER.

Fungi and more

The very mild and wet autumn and winter produced an incredible show of fungi. It just went on and on with very few frosts to end the fungi fruiting season. There was a wonderful array and abundance of species around the village and many front lawns and green spaces had some spectacular displays.

I was very pleased to find the rather rare and beautiful Wrinkled Peach on piles of Elm logs that had been left for wildlife at Buckden Towers. I was also stopped in my tracks one morning as I drove to work by the sight of two large "peaches" growing on what was obviously an Elm log marking the boundary of a resident's flowerbed (see photo). It was a fantastic autumn for this rare species that grows on Elm, and wonderful to know we have it in Buckden too.

This is just one of the scarce species associated with Elm, so it such a tragedy that the mature Elm hedge was taken out on Luck's Lane. It doesn't look as if the Elm has been replaced in the subsequent replanting which will take decades to start to resemble anything useful for wildlife.

Other rare wildlife is associated with the Poplars at Buckden Marina and I was pleased to find tiny Poplar Bells on fallen, wet branches in February. Hopefully these trees are left alone as several mature specimens were removed further to the north and we would lose a whole community of species if we lost all our Poplars.

One of my favourite fungal finds was a colony of stunning Fly Agaric toadstools growing under its associate tree, Birch, on one of the greens in Greenway in October (see photos). Sadly, a few days later, the ominous early-morning roar of mowers had me rushing out of my house, but my fears were confirmed when I saw that they'd all been chopped up. I had a chat with those doing the work and thankfully they said they could be mowed around next year if I fence them off.

A lack of awareness of wildlife contributes to the destruction of things that fail to conform to many people's view of "tidy" rather than it always being deliberate. It was great to see the amazing turnout of hundreds of people for the "What on Earth can Buckden do?" climate change event at the village hall and

that The Wildlife Trust (where their Chief executive Brian Eversham gave a fantastic talk about the effects of climate change on our wildlife) and Woodland Trust were present. There's now a big drive to plant trees in Britain to help combat climate change. Wouldn't it be nice to see some of the land being sold, and lined up, for ultra-profitable housing schemes in the village given over to this cause instead?

It has been great to work with the Parish Council (who are doing an excellent job for our wildlife and wild places), at the church. While much Bramble has been cleared, there are plans to create large areas of wildflowers, which the many bees that nest in the walls nearby will benefit from. I also ensured piles of super-valuable logs and branches were left for wildlife. If you do one thing for wildlife this year, which will also save you money needed to dispose of it, leave a pile of old branches or logs in a quiet corner to make a mini nature reserve. We can't expect to benefit from beautiful birdsong, butterflies, bees and more if we keep making everything so monochrome and "tidy"!

We have had a rarity spending winter with us again with a Siberian Chiffchaff frequenting the ivy, trees and scrub alongside the sewage works where many flies and other insects remain active all winter and there was a good dawn chorus going in the village as early as February. A Mistle Thrush was a particularly fine sound coming from Buckden Towers and several Song Thrushes were in full voice by then. Blackbirds were also going earlier than usual. The quality of our Buckden dawn chorus is another huge asset for those of us lucky to live here.

Another treat in later winter was something I'd never noticed before: a stunning display of Winter Aconites opposite Buckden Towers and within its grounds, a fine display of Winter Heliotrope. The Towers is a superb spot for wildlife and wonderful to see it managed for its great historical importance and wildlife. It is one of several "hotspots" identified in the Buckden Neighbourhood Plan.

George Furbank Professional rugby player and international.

2nd February, 2020 at 2.55p.m., UK time, George Furbank stands alongside his fellow players in the England Rugby Union team in the Stade de France, Paris, belting out the national anthem. This is surely the proudest moment in George's life as he is chosen to represent his country for the first time. And back in Buckden, many are supporting George as he takes his first step into the international arena.

In winning his first cap, George was building on a career that has taken him from local club, Huntingdon RUFC and their Mini and Junior sections, to full international in a short time. He is now a member of an international team that finished runners-up in the recent World Cup and playing alongside established stars and household names such as Owen Farrell and Maro Itoje.

George was born and raised in Buckden where his family name is well known. The Furbank family have been associated with Huntingdon RUFC for around 70 years (his dad was a Club Captain for six years in the 1990s) and it was natural that George would play his first rugby from the age of five or so with the "Stags" Mini and Junior sections .

George was also good at other sports, including cricket where he was a talented batsman and was on the books at Leicestershire until reaching the under-16 level. By that age rugby was becoming the most serious sporting option and, after transferring from Kimbolton to Bedford School for the sixth form, he

played for the Bedford School rugby 1st XV before joining up with the Northampton Saints' Senior Academy in 2015. Progress for George was relatively fast after that and he helped his team win the Premiership Rugby U18s League trophy before becoming a fully-fledged Northampton "Saints" RUFC player (Saints number 1986) in November 2017.

George made his Northampton Saints debut in the Anglo Welsh Cup in November 2018 against the Exeter Chiefs and scored his first senior try. The 2018/19 season was his breakthrough year and in total he played in 18 matches and won the Club's Player of the Month award for February 2019.

George also played in Northampton's European Challenge Cup quarter-final game in Clermont Auvergne (France) and Saints' Premiership Rugby Cup final victory in 2019, helping Northampton claim a first piece of silverware in five seasons.

The latest, and most significant chapter to George's career is very recent. On 20 January 2020 George received his first call up to the senior England squad for the 2020 Six Nations Championship and within just a few days was then selected to make his England debut against France in Paris.

The test match against France proved to be a very difficult one for the England team, but George will surely make his mark internationally before too long. Indeed, George was awarded his second cap the following week against Scotland in a match that England won.

One question remains – will we see a new 'George' on the sign outside the George Hotel?







At our February meeting we welcomed Kevin Duke from Cambridgeshire Fire Service. His talk was entitled "Safe and Well" and we all learned something new about safety in our homes.

He emphasised how important it was to check ID before letting anyone into your home - something we all know but it's so easy to see a uniform and believe it to be genuine.

The main area of risk in all our homes is the kitchen where there are the most electrical items, the cooker being the most likely to cause a fire. Extinguishers and fire blankets were NOT recommended as you can't always be sure that the fire is either out or contained - better to ring 999 and get out as quickly as possible, especially at night.

In the sitting room candles pose the biggest problem and should always be in a holder as the metal bits (especially those under tea lights) get very hot and can melt whatever is underneath them.

He explained that anything that gets hot is using a lot of electricity so be wary of extension cables. Gang extensions are fine but avoid daisy chains where multiple extension leads are joined together. Cube and drum ones were also discouraged.

Kevin went on to say that the risk of a fire can be reduced but never eliminated. Test alarms regularly, close internal doors especially at night (this will hold back any smoke) and have a clear escape route by keeping the stairs, landing etc. clear. Keep the door key near the door and leave off the security

chain at night in order to expedite leaving the house. If the site of the fire prevents you leaving a room then open a window to let fresh air in, shout very loudly in the hope that a neighbour will hear you, and phone the fire brigade who will continue talking to you, calming you down and gaining information until the fire service arrives.



He concluded his informative talk by telling us about the many gadgets and gizmos available for the hard of hearing and those with mobility problems.

Many of our members had questions and Kevin was more than happy to answer them whilst enjoying a cup of tea and homemade biscuits with us.

Our next meeting is on March 3rd at 7.30pm when we will be having a talk and demonstration by "Sugar Daddies" from St Neots. The competition is for a spring flower arrangement and contributions for the market stall will be most welcome. Visitors and new members are always welcome.
